To Whom it Concerns

The first Tuesday after the fire started 11th February 2014, I worked for 2 hours cleaning a child care building located in Maryvale Crescent Morwell. My 13 year old grandson came with me then went to his friends mother's rented house in the fire started I got a 30 year mortgage on an old house that I have had work done to to make it livable.

As the fire has now impacted on the salability of properties in Morwell if I was to sell and move away from the area I believe that I would lucky to get enough money to pay the mortgage back, losing over \$50,000 in deposit and work done to the property.

At 5 am on the following Sunday a week after the fire started I was concerned about the smoke and so I checked the EPA website and saw that the reading was 1500 AQI. I did not know what that meant so I googled the meaning of AQI and noticed that the dangerously high reading was 150 AQI. The reading at that time was 10 times that and we could hardly breathe. So I rang the EPAs 24 hour phone number to be told that if I was concerned about the smoke that I should contact the CFA.

That morning when my grandson woke he complained about a sore throat and by evening he was so sick I took him to Latrobe Regional Hospital where the triage nurse said that he had a major throat infection. We waited 8 hours to see a doctor but the hospital was very busy so by that time it was 2 am Monday 17 th February 2014. My grandson said he just wanted to go home without seeing a doctor. So I took him home and later that day to his own doctor who prescribed very strong antibiotics. As he was having trouble breathing he could not sleep so two days later I bought him a ventalin puffer over the counter. This helped ease his breathing and enabled him to sleep as he had a very bad dry cough. He missed 3 days of school and because the secondary schools didn't close down the children were made to go outside at lunchtime even though the smoke was quite bad. He is well now and no longer on ventalin. I am concerned about the long term effects on him and other children in his age group. I would like to suggest that if this ever happened again that the secondary students also be given the opportunity to relocate schools.

Another friend of mine is an 88 year old lady who lives with her grand-daughter in Morwell. She was falling asleep while mixing a cake mix. I noted that her house was old and the doors have cracks and that the smoke was getting in. I suspect the carbon-monoxide was affecting her ability to get oxygen and therefore making her very sleepy.
