Health Monitoring CO Testing Process

Effective of N/S 21/02/14 until further notice.

The activity of fighting fires potentially exposes personnel to carbon monoxide (CO). Carbon monoxide is a particularly insidious gas that potentially threatens the health and well-being of people entering the mine.

The principle objective of this document is to ensure the health and wellbeing of personnel; with a heavy importance on advancing the firefighting effort and continuing mining operations without compromising the health and wellbeing of personnel.

There are several "non-negotiable rules" that apply in managing carbon monoxide. These are:

- 1. All crews must be checked by Health Monitoring personnel prior to entering the mine.
- 2. All crew leaders are to collect carbon monoxide detectors and ensure there is one per team.
- 3. All crews to log the current detector readings every 15 minutes on supplied log sheet.
- 4. Readings to be provided to Hazelwood Div Comm Officer including map grid reference every hour on **UHF Channel** or **Conventional radio channel**
- 5. All crews must be rechecked by Health Monitoring personnel <u>at the conclusion</u> of their shift prior to leaving the site.
- 6. Personnel will not be permitted to leave the site without appropriate clearance provided by Health Monitoring personnel.

CO Concentrations

0 - 30 ppm

- Workers can continue to work throughout normal shift duration
- Workers must continue to monitor CO detector recordings as normal
- There is no requirement for health check during shift, however all workers must be tested prior to and after completing their shift.

> 30ppm to 50ppm

Crews must not work in the mine for a continuous period greater than 2 consecutive hours without leaving the mine for CO testing at the Health Monitoring station.

> 50ppm

- Crews are to leave work area immediately
- Report to Health Monitoring for testing



CO Testing

The testing of personnel and associated responses are as follows:

- 1% to 4% no restrictions, can start or return to work
- 5% and above employee to wait 15 minutes and be re-tested
 - if re-test level < 5% there are no restrictions and employee can return to work
 - if levels still > 5% employee will be escorted home and will not be able to return to site for a period of no less than 24 hours from the time of testing
 - if levels are > 8% employee will be escorted to hospital via paramedics

In Addition:

- The personal monitors provide guidance for crews to manage exposure.
- Once you have exited the mine, open car windows to allow any C.O build up to escape from the vehicle.
- If you are unable start <u>or</u> to return to work <u>or</u> are instructed to leave site, contact your Supervisor or Site Contact immediately.

Priority Cards:

In order to streamline the health monitoring process during busy periods, particularly at shift changeover, GDF Suez employees and selected contractors will be issued with a 'Priority Card' which will indicate their priority to be tested at the CO Monitoring Station.

To assist with the process, the following will occur:

- During peak times, the CFA will establish a dedicated table for testing of GDF Suez employees.
- 'Priority Cards' are available from GDF Suez Supervisors, Leading Hands and Work Group Leaders.
- Employees and contractors should retain their 'Priority Card' whilst the health monitoring process is in place.
